





15 YEAR SAFETY AWARD

FEBRUARY IS NATIONAL CANCER PREVENTION MONTH

Learn how to spot and prevent cancer - Cancer can affect people of all ages, genders and ethnicities. That's why it's so important to become familiar with the warning signs and make sure you're taking advantage of potentially life-saving health screenings. After all, lowering your risk of cancer can be one of the keys to a longer, healthier life for you and your loved ones.

BREAST CANCER: Women age 50 to 74 at average risk for breast cancer should receive a mammogram every two years. Some experts recommend different ages to start screening and different screening frequencies. If you are over 40, talk to your physician about what is right for you.

2 CERVICAL CANCER: Women should begin screening at age 21 and repeat every three years until age 65 OR every five years from age 30 to 65 if using a combined pap smear and human papillomavirus (HPV) screening.

3 SKIN CANCER: Men and women should report any unusual moles and warts or changes in skin to their doctor. Also talk to your doctor if you are at increased risk of skin cancer.

RECOMMENDED **CANCER SCREENINGS**

4 COLORECTAL CANCER: Men and women should begin screening at age 45 and continue until age 75.

5 LUNG CANCER: Men and women age 55 to 80 should receive a yearly lung cancer screening if they have a history of heavy smoking and smoke now or have quit within the past 15 years.

OPERITY OF STATE CANCER: Men should begin screening at age 55 and continue until age 69. Starting at age 45, men at higher than average risk of prostate cancer should talk with a doctor about the uncertainties, risks and potential benefits of testing.

10 CANCER-PREVENTION STRATEGIES



- **BE SUN SMART:** The most common form of cancer in the U.S. is skin cancer, striking about 1 million Americans each year.
- 2 PUT A LIMIT ON ALCOHOL: Drinking alcohol is linked to a greater risk of mouth, throat, voice box, esophageal, liver, breast and probably colorectal cancer.



- **3 GET SCREENED:** Talk to your health care provider about screening recommendations.
- 4 AVOID CHEMICAL EXPOSURE: Chemicals found in the environment, including some workplaces and certain hobbies, can raise your risk for many types of cancer, including kidney and bladder.



- **5** STAY PHYSICALLY ACTIVE: Studies show physical activity helps to maintain a healthy weight, and it may lower the risk for breast and colon cancer.
- 6 EAT HEALTHY AND MAINTAIN A HEALTHY WEIGHT: Eat a diet rich in fruits, vegetables, whole grains, nuts and lean meats.
- QUIT TOBACCO: Tobacco use is the biggest risk factor for cancer and not just lung cancer.



- 8 REMEMBER RADON: Radon, the second leading cause of lung cancer, occurs naturally as radioactive elements in rocks and soil gradually break down.
- **9 GET IMMUNIZED:** Some viral and bacterial infections are associated with cancer. Discuss vaccinations with your health care provider.



O AVOID RISKY SEXUAL BEHAVIORS: Sexual activities such as having sex with multiple partners and/or unprotected sex between non-exclusive partners may lead to sexually transmitted diseases and/ or other serious infections, including HPV, HIV and AIDS.



POSSIBLE CANCER SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

While the following signs and symptoms are often caused by something other than cancer, they could be your body's way of telling you that something isn't right. Listen to your gut and get checked out if they are persistent or if you have a combination of problems.

- Persistent back pain
- Long-term constipation or diarrhea
- Pain or difficulty when urinating
- Unexplained weight loss
- Excessive fatigue that doesn't get better with rest
- Skin, mole or wart changes, or sores that don't heal
- Lumps or thickening in the testicles or breast area
- Nagging cough or hoarseness
- Unusual bleeding or discharge
- Indigestion or trouble swallowing
- White patches in mouth or on tongue





Safety Manager Tip of the Month Watch for black ice!

Old Man Winter has been at it again. Most of the country has been experiencing below normal temperatures. To make matters worse, many areas that have received the accompanying snow and ice, such as the South, are not equipped to handle it.

When snow is falling so furiously that it limits visibility or when ice covers the road creating slick conditions, even the most experienced driver can be caught in precarious situations. Add a big rig to the mix and the risks become even greater.

Experienced, professional drivers are aware of the hazards of driving in such weather and compensate by paying particular attention to the route details of driving. No one wants to be stranded in cold weather. Special attention is given to vehicle inspections, and truck stop talk centers around road conditions. Everyone knows the dangers of driving commercial vehicles on snow and ice covered roads.

In addition to the usual snow and ice, there is an unseen enemy on the highways during cold weather; black ice! Black ice is probably the most dangerous condition you will encounter on the highway during winter months. The extreme danger is so great because the condition is totally unexpected. Black ice is the condition that results when the temperature drops so fast that light rain or moisture freezes on the road into a smooth, sometimes invisible and extremely slippery surface. The road surface looks entirely normal.

The only defense against black ice is to be aware that the condition exists and of the consequences of encountering it.



Keep your mind on your driving and memorize these helpful tips:

- 1. Remember that rapidly falling temperatures and moisture on the roadway are ideal conditions for the formation of black ice.
- 2. Keep your eyes on the spray being thrown by vehicles in front of you. As long as you can see spray, the roadway has not frozen over entirely. If there is a sudden lack of spray from the tires and other vehicles.... watch out! Conditions are prime or black Ice.
- 3. You can check for the formation of ice by rolling down your window and feeling for ice crystals forming on your mirror mounts. If ice is present there, you can safely bet that it will be on the highway as well.

Remember, when road conditions are bad, you are a professional driver. While it certainly is important that your load gets delivered, it is more important that you arrive there safely!

WINTER DRIVING: BE PREPARED FOR EVERY SITUATION



It's important to check that you have the right equipment before you start your journey, especially during the harsh winter months. Make sure you are ready for every possible situation and be sure to check that you have the following items on hand:



1 De-icer and ice scraper – front and rear windshields must be clear of snow and ice before you set off



② A shovel and a bag of sand or salt

– minor roads are not always immediately cleared and salted so it can be quite easy to get stuck



3 Jumper cables – just in case your truck (or someone else's) won't start



A warm blanket and extra warm clothes – it is a good idea to carry extra clothes in case you get stranded



6 Food and water – just in case you get stuck and are waiting for recovery or help



6 At least half a tank of gas always – journeys may take longer than planned or you may need to find alternative routes



A flashlight



8 A high-visibility jacket
